Compare the commitments

Anthony Albanese has committed to: more security, more support, more jobs.

Stronger manufacturing

- \$15B National Reconstruction Fund (NRF) to rebuild local manufacturing
- \$6.2B to support steel, aluminium, and green metals industries
- \$219M to save Whyalla Steelworks
- \$500M for Aussie-made steel, thousands of union jobs and apprenticeships

Union jobs & workers' rights

- Ensuring "Same Job, Same Pay"
- Stronger rights for labour hires and delegates
- Multi-employer bargaining
- Future Made in Australia plan locks in local supply and jobs

Peter Dutton has committed to: cuts, rollbacks and risk to workers.

Cuts to local industry

- Abolish the National Reconstruction Fund (NRF)
- Fewer local jobs, apprenticeships, and less manufacturing
- No plan to support Aussie-made supply chains

Attacks on workers' rights

- Repeal "Right to Disconnect" expect to work after hours
- Change casual worker definitions and create less job security
- Opposed "Same Job, Same Pay" reform
- Sweeping IR reforms that emulates John Howard





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Anthony Albanese has committed to: stronger safety, more backing, more opportunities.

Cost-of-living relief

- \$1000 automatic tax deduction
- \$150 off power bills + \$300 rebate
- \$25 cap on PBS
- Medicare: More free GP visits
- Stage 3 tax cuts—an average of \$2500 for workers
- Minimum wage increases
- 20% cut to student debt
- Ban supermarket price gouging

Union voices at the table

- Workers included in national manufacturing decisions
- Promoting Aussie-made goods created by Union members

Peter Dutton has committed to: slashes, backflips and uncertainty for workers.

Cost-of-living proposals

- Repeal Labor's tax cuts, giving no long-term tax relief for workers
- Temporary fuel tax cut of just \$6 per week and ends after 12 months
- One-off tax refund of up to \$1200, with no plans for ongoing relief
- Announced cutting 49,000 public service jobs and ending work from home

Profits over people

- \$500M tax breaks on corporate lunches
- \$600B nuclear industry that delivers little energy and no immediate jobs
- Abolishing \$16B in support for local industry to invest in new technology to reduce their carbon emissions
